

We appreciate your understanding as we navigate this change, and we will keep you updated as we explore the best solutions moving forward.

Free school meals and Pupil Premium



Many parents of children in

Reception, Year One, and Year Two mistakenly believe their child qualifies for the Pupil Premium because they receive Universal Infant Free School Meals. However, these meals are provided to all children in these year groups, regardless of household income, and are not means-tested. As a result, we may be missing out on valuable additional funding for eligible younger children. This funding is crucial, as it helps support catch-up programs, provides assistance with uniform purchases, and covers the costs of school trips and other enriching experiences.
